#### Accomplishments of 2021

**Events & Stewardship** 



In 2021, Free the Fern members organized **11 events**. Including an <u>Invasive Removal Zoom</u>, <u>Indigenous Plant Walk</u>, <u>Community Planting Event</u>, <u>Winter Solstice Lantern Workshop</u> & <u>Procession</u>, and 7 other pull and planting events.

Free the Fern began stewarding (removing invasive plants and planting native plants) at <u>4</u> areas along the Red Alder Trail - adjacent to Kinross Creek Co-op, Cartier Place, Matheson Heights Co-op, and Alexander Laidlaw Co-op.

## Administration



Free the Fern developed a logo (designed by Kiki Nombrado), <u>trail signs</u> (designed by Teresa Gagné), a <u>website</u>, an <u>instagram</u>, and <u>videos</u> (including one by award winning filmmaker, Daniel Akinshola), which created more visibility for Free the Fern.

Grace Nombrado also created a <u>Free the Fern lending library</u> with many books generously donated by Free the Fern members.

# Funding

In 2021, Free the Fern members received 9 <u>Neighbourhood Small Grants</u> (totalling \$3500), **1** <u>Rising Youth Grant</u> (\$750), and 1 <u>TD Park People Grant</u> (\$2000). For a total of **\$6,250** in grant funding. We also received over **\$900** in donations from local strata, co-ops, and businesses (Independent Grocer & Gardenworks). Free the Fern used grant funding to organize our events (food & beverages, videography, and promotion), purchase a set of gardening tools (12 shovels, 6 rakes, 8 pruners, 32 garden gloves and more), and purchase soil and native plants.

In addition, our <u>Art for Plants Fundraiser</u>, with bird art by Kiki Nombrado, raised a total of **\$2,063.** 100% of these funds will be used for native plants.

## **Volunteer Hours**



In 2021, **52 volunteers** spent **583 hours** helping to:

51 % remove invasive plants

16% replant native plants

13% add leaf mulch to the soil

12% watering

9% other (raking, photography, garbage clean-up etc)

# **Invasive Removal**



Volunteers removed a total of **66,420 L (23.5 tons)** of invasive plants from the Champlain Heights Trail in 2021. This is equal to **290 city green bins** (120L-360L size) or **370 bathtubs** of invasives!

Types of invasive plants removed, included:

33% English Ivy

- 24% Himalayan blackberry
- 20% **Lamium**

9% Italian Arum

5% Common Periwinkle

9% Others (morning glory, English holly, Daphne etc.)

# Native Planting



Volunteers planted over 551 native plants in the Champlain Heights Trail.

Our most commonly planted native plants were:

- 1. Western sword fern
- 2. dwarf Oregon grape
- 3. thimbleberry
- 4. salal
- 5. vine maple

Volunteers moved over **106 wheelbarrows worth of leaf mulch** into our stewardship sites. This leaf mulch helped to preserve the moisture and biodiversity of the soil after invasive removal.

With the leadership of Teresa Gagné, Free the Fern also experimented with <u>native plant</u> <u>propagation</u> using softwood cuttings.

#### **Monthly Invasive Pull - Cartier Place**



On Saturday, December 4, 2021, Cartier Place hosted our Monthly Invasive Pull adjacent to the Red Alder Trail. 14 volunteers, of all ages, helped with removing invasive English ivy, Himalayan blackberry and English holly. #### Winter Solstice Lantern Procession



On December 19, 2021, thanks to support from a <u>Neighbourhood Small Grant</u> and <u>Kinross</u> <u>Creek Co-op</u> Social Committee, Free the Fern hosted the first annual, Winter Solstice Lantern Procession in Champlain Heights!

In the lead up to the event, we ran two lantern making workshops where 30 participants, of all ages, learned how to make a globe-style lantern with tissue paper and pressed Japanese maple leaves.

We had planned to run the procession on the night of Winter Solstice (December 21), but the forecast was calling for icy rain. So, we moved the event up two days, to December 19, 2021. It turned out to be a great decision, as December 19 turned out to be a beautiful clear night with a view of the full moon and stars. Kiki Nombrado led the procession up the Red Alder Trail, playing holiday favourites on the glockenspiel. We then returned to Kinross Creek Co-op to enjoy hot chocolate, cookies, and caroling.

#### Art for Plants Update

On December 4, 2021 at the <u>Tugboat Landing Artisan Market</u>, Free the Fern had a table of our art as part of our <u>Art for Plants Fundraiser</u>. It was a very successful event with hundreds of individuals attending the market. We succeeded in selling **\$670** worth of art!

In 2021, Free the Fern raised **\$2063** dollars with our Art for Plants Fundraiser. We have used over **\$800** this year to purchase plants for stewardship sites along the Red Alder Trail. We will be using the remaining **\$1,135** for planting along the Red Alder Trail in 2022.

#### **Events Postponed**

Due to the Omicron variant, Free the Fern has postponed two of our scheduled events. Our **Invasive Plant Mapping Project**, scheduled for December 27-29, has been postponed until the **end of April**, **2022**. We look forward to welcoming volunteers from the <u>BCIT Ecological</u> <u>Restoration Program</u> and <u>Invasive Species Council of BC</u> to help with the mapping of the invasives on the Red Alder Trail at that time.

In addition, our **Monthly Invasive Pull**, adjacent to Matheson Heights Co-op, that was originally scheduled for January 8, 2022, has been tentatively rescheduled to **February 5**, **2022**.

The health and safety of our volunteer stewards is of the utmost importance. We will continue to monitor the situation moving forward. Please check our <u>events</u> page for any updates.
