Neighbourhood Clean-up Party!

Weed & Feed

On Saturday, September 24, 2022, Free the Fern president, Martin Collins, hosted a <u>Weed & Feed</u> event. 18 volunteers gathered to clear invasive Himalayan blackberry and ivy from the <u>Red Alder Trail</u>, adjacent to Alexander Laidlaw Co-op. They succeeded in removing 7 green bins worth of invasives.

Following which, volunteers enjoyed a wonderfully chili bbq, prepared by Martin's wife, Joyce. Funding for this event was provided by <u>Neighbourhood Small Grants.</u>



Green Streets

Free the Fern is happy to announce that we have officially joined with the <u>Green Streets</u> <u>Program.</u> This is a city program that allows citizens to adopt areas, often traffic circles and

street sides, to garden. Our Free the Fern stewards have then officially "adopted" the Champlain Heights Trail system as our area that we care for within the Green Streets. We now can connect with a network of volunteers across the city and access support.



The Triangle

Free the Fern volunteers have been busy clearing out Himalayan blackberry regrowth from an area of the Red Alder trail commonly known as "The Triangle". We began initially clearing this area last February. Prior to that, it had been a dense thicket of blackberry and ivy. After clearing most of the surface invasives, we recently saw some regrowth. So, our volunteers have been helping to dig out all the Himalayan blackberry roots. This is in preparation for our Grow Wild! Event next month. At our event, the area will be a designated "youth planting area", with hundreds of native plants slated to be planted by local youth under 30 years old. Thank you to our amazing volunteers for helping with this ecological restoration effort!
