An Action Packed April!

April turned out to be Free the Fern's busiest months ever, as our volunteers and directors participated in five environmental events.



On April 1, 2023, A record 25 volunteers attended our monthly <u>Invasive Pull</u> on the Red Alder Trail. 8 of the volunteers were under the age of 18! Together we managed to clear 2,640 L of invasive ivy and Himalayan blackberry (the equivalent of 8 city green bins)! Amazing! This is in the area that will be our future <u>Native Food Forest</u> planting site.



On April 12, 2023, Free the Fern President, Grace, and Treasurer, Joe, attended the <u>Be</u> <u>Aware Fair</u> at Windsor Secondary in North Vancouver. This event, part of Climate Action Week, was an opportunity for students to come together from across North Vancouver to learn about the environment from local non-profits. Free the Fern had an info table set-up in the gym and also did a live presentation on how to use ivy for weaving.



On April 15, 2023, Free the Fern was honoured to partner with eco-artist <u>Joshua Ralph</u>, to run a <u>Bird Nesting Cage workshop</u>. Made out of invasive Himalayan blackberry and morning glory, these nesting cages were stuffed with nesting material (such as animal fur and dried grass). Participants could then take home the nesting cages to hang in their garden for the local birds to collect nesting material from.



On April 20, 2023, Free the Fern President, Grace, led a Weaving with Ivy workshop at Killarney Community Centre. Grace was happy to be able to share her knowledge with participants from the general public, along with representatives from the <u>Invasive Species</u> <u>Council of BC</u> and <u>Stanley Park Ecology Society</u>. She hopes that participants may pass on the skill of weaving with ivy to others.



On April 22, 2023, Free the Fern was excited to participate at <u>Earth Fest</u> in Everett Crowley Park. We had 8 volunteers on hand helping at our table: teaching about native plants, demonstrating weaving with ivy, recruiting volunteers, and making a pressed flower suncatcher craft.
