Community planting

In an effort to heal the forest, volunteers have been removing invasive species from the Red Alder Trail. Now, we will be gathering to plant hundreds of native plants. All ages welcome! Tools & gloves provided.

Following the planting, we will celebrate with a drumming & dance performance by the Coastal Wolf Pack, a multigeneration Coast Salish performance group.



We are excited to announce our <u>Healing Forest Planting</u> event on **Saturday**, **Oct 19, 2024**, **10am-12pm**. Over the past 11 months our volunteers have been working hard to remove invasive ivy and Himalayan blackberry from the eastern side of the Red Alder Trail. At our Healing Forest event, we are excited to be able to plant 648 native plants, including salmonberry, elderberry, woodland strawberry, sword fern, Oregon grape and more.

We need volunteer help with setting up the plants along the trail from 9am-10am. You can sign up here to help.

Gloves and shovels will be provided.

Following the planting we will share bannock & jam prepared by Elder, Marge Wylie. We will also have a return performance by the incredible <u>Tsatsu Stalqayu</u> (Coastal Wolf Pack).

Rezoning for Champlain Heights

The City of Vancouver is <u>proposing rezoning neighbourhoods across the city</u>, along with our neighbourhood of Champlain Heights, to allow for non-market housing 15-18 storeys in height. Our neighbourhood contains some of the last remaining native forest in the city, including the Champlain Heights Trail that we steward. Community members are concerned about the environmental impact of building towers adjacent to a habitat for eagles, owls, bats, woodpeckers and more. You can <u>attend a public information</u> session this week to learn more about this rezoning proposal.

We will be removing the last bit of invasive ivy & Himalayan blackberry from our planting area along the eastern edge of the Red Alder Trail. Come join us! Snacks & drinks included!



Truth & Reconciliation Planting

On Monday, Sept 30, 12 volunteers gathered for an impromptu <u>Truth & Reconciliation</u> <u>Planting event</u>. Together, we planted 90 native plants along the Red Alder Trail. We consider our stewardship effort to be an act of healing and reconciliation, as we seek to replace colonial invasive species with Indigenous plant species native to our area. We hope to make this planting an annual tradition to honour Truth & Reconciliation. Plants were donated to us from the <u>Green Streets Program</u> & purchased from the <u>Echo Ecological Plant</u> <u>Fundraiser</u>.



Ivy Weaving Workshop - Sun, Nov 10, 10am-12pm

Free the Fern is excited to be partnering with the <u>Everett Crowley Park Committee</u> to organize an <u>Ivy Weaving Workshop</u> on Sun, Nov 10, 10am–12pm.
