Planting During an Atmospheric River!



On October 20, 2024, Free the Fern hosted our <u>Healing Forest Planting</u> event on the Red Alder Trail. 33 volunteers braved the atmospheric river and helped us plant 600 native plants on the east side of the trail! Plants, purchased from <u>NATS Nursery</u>, included sword fern, elderberry, oceanspray, salmonberry, woodland strawberry and more.

Originally, the planting had been scheduled for Saturday, but we decided to postpone the event by one day, in the hopes that the atmospheric river would pass. However, by midday

Sunday, the rain actually began to pick up and a creek began forming along the Red Alder Trail! We were surprised and impressed when so many volunteers showed up to help out at our event, despite the rain!

We had 3 volunteer leads, Ellie, Cole, and Chinonso (pictured), guide the planting along the trail. We also had friendly volunteers stationed at our welcome table to check in our planting volunteers when they arrived. Volunteer planters ranged in age from less than 5 years to over 70 years old! Everyone had a great time and we succeeded in getting all the plants in the ground in just one hour!



Thanks to the Everett Crowley Park Committee for generously loaning us shovels and tents. Our volunteers were able to take breaks to hide from the rain. We were also able to warm

up our hands with hot cups of coffee provided by Starbucks. We also enjoyed freshly baked bannock with homemade jam, prepared by Elder in Residence, Marge Wylie. Our event ended with a prize draw for t-shirts and bags and a surprise rendition of happy birthday and cake for our Executive Director, Grace Nombrado, and our board Secretary, Barbara Lane. So, despite the rain, our spirits stayed warm!
