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Light up the Night in Champlain Heights



On Sunday, Dec 15 Free the Fern held our 4th annual <u>Light up the Night in Champlain</u> <u>Heights</u> event. Approximately 120 community members came out to enjoy the event.

The day before the event there was an extreme windstorm, which brought down many branches and several trees along the Red Alder trail. Luckily, Free the Fern volunteers and a local Landscaper, Andrew Pereda, offered to help clear the trail – just in time for our lantern procession!



At 3pm on Dec 15, 16 volunteers arrived to help set-up lanterns along the trail. This year we were grateful to have support from the Everett Crowley Park Committee, including Stewardship Coordinator, Evie Osborn, President, Damian Assadi,in addition to our other amazing community volunteers. We placed over 100 lanterns along the trail, made out of mason jars, milk jugs, toilet paper rolls, and cedar and holly branches.



The theme of this year's festival was "Connected Stories". 10 partner artists, led by lead artist, <u>Joshua Ralph</u>, helped create art lanterns inspired by this theme. These lanterns

Under a full moon, we gathered at the Douglas Fir Teaching Garden. Then, at 6:30pm, <u>the</u> <u>Carnival Band</u> led a lantern procession along the Red Alder trail.



Along the way, we enjoyed some special performances by Olaf the snowman (Kiki Nombrado), a T-Rex (Connor Knock) and a Forest Fairy (Julia Parker). We then returned back to the Douglas Fir Teaching Garden to enjoy cookies (baked by the community) and hot chocolate.

This year's Light up the Night in Champlain Heights festival was organized by Free the Fern in collaboration with the <u>Everett Crowley Park Committee</u>. Funding was provided by

Saturday, Jan 25, 10:30-12 pm - <u>Winter's Green: Frosty Ferns & Firs</u> - Stanley Park, Vancouver Gain insight into the crucial roles that plants like ferns, Douglas-firs, and other resilient plants play in forest ecology.
