We are excited to launch our <u>Nature is for Everyone Program</u> this month!

In 2024, Free the Fern members approved an <u>Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion Policy</u>. Since then, we have made it a priority to be more inclusive and welcoming at all of our events. We acknowledge that some groups may face barriers to participation in stewardship. So, with our Nature is for Everyone Program, we hope to increase access to nature for everyone.

Invasive Pull - Sat, Feb 1, 10am-12pm

Mushroom Felting Workshop - Sat, Feb 15

On Sat, Feb 15, 10am-12pm, join felter, Anna Bondartchouk, for a <u>Mushroom Felting</u> <u>Workshop</u>. Anna frequently runs felting workshops with <u>Stanley Park Ecology Society</u>, and

we are honoured to have her join us for the first time. Anna will demonstrate how to create an Amanita muscaria mushroom out of felt. Those under 12 must be accompanied by an adult. This workshop is currently full, but please add your name to our <u>waitlist</u>, as space will likely open up.



Buds, Branches, and Bark - Sat, Jan 18

On Sat, Jan 18, we were honoured to welcome back BCIT Instructor, <u>Julia Alards-Tomalin</u>, for a second annual, <u>Buds, Branches, and Bark Walk</u>. Julia taught 27 eager participants about the parts of a branch (passing out her amazing collection of sticks!) She then led us on a walk down the Red Alder Trail. We were able to learn how to ID a variety of native plants, including osoberry, big leaf maple, red flowering currant, oceanspray, thimbleberry, and snowberry. Social Housing Rezoning

The City of Vancouver is proposing rezoning our neighbourhood of Champlain Heights, along with other neighbourhoods throughout the city, to allow 15-18 storey social housing. Currently, the Champlain Heights Trail System, which Free the Fern stewards, is included within the planned map for this rezoning. Thank you to the many local Champlain Heights residents who gave their feedback and signed our petition (started by Free the Fern board director, Catherine Munn) in late 2024. The city has now summarized this public feedback (see pages 12-13). 68% of the public feedback was in opposition to rezoning Champlain Heights, in particular due to concerns about its impact on our sensitive ecosystem. Free the Fern will continue to advocate to protect the Champlain Heights Trail system. There will be one more round of public feedback for this proposal in June, before it is brought to city council for a vote. Check the city page to stay up to date on this rezoning and please express your opinion during the second round of public feedback in June.



Private Events

Did you know that Free the Fern offers private events to local nonprofits, businesses, and schools? These events can be catered to all ages and include native plant walks, invasive pulls, presentations, plantings, and ivy weaving workshops. These private events can be held along the beautiful Red Alder Trail in South East Vancouver or hosted by your organization with the Lower Mainland. So far, we have partnered with Fresh Roots, Stanley Park Ecology Society, SFU, UBC, Scouts Canada, and local Elementary schools to offer Free the Fern private workshops and walks.
